On the last morning, we hiked back down to the trailhead and quickly got in the van to avoid the hordes of bugs. We finished off the trip by stopping for lunch (and delicious huckleberry milkshakes!) in Trout Lake.

We were shocked to realize it was already our last day at camp, so we decided to go out with a bang, climbing a mountain with a 360-degree view of the area at the summit, rappelling down a practically vertical rock face, and hiking back to our camp in the pouring rain.

We all felt super lucky to have been on the trip, and after packing up we were all a little sad to leave our camp. Luckily we all still have amazing memories of this experience.

This course is open to students who have experience climbing outdoors and are comfortable with toproping.
